

### **GA2** Committee Recap

As a result of the major interruptions in learning caused by the COVID-19 pandemic, the world has suffered from reduction in educational advancement. Additionally, the pandemic has also had a detrimental effect on educators, exacerbating challenges with grading and assessment, intensifying stress and burnout, and raising concerns about teacher shortages and turnover rates.

The worldwide pandemic has brought attention to the digital divide, which is characterized by differences in access to resources and technology necessary for successful remote learning. In the post-pandemic world, achieving equity in education, ensuring justice, and providing equitable access to resources and support have become critical objectives. Comprehensive frameworks are required to address health support, investing in teacher training, bridging the digital divide, offering catch-up programs, and filling knowledge and skill gaps.

An issue the committee will discuss for the following three days is solving the problem of disparate educational opportunities in the post-pandemic era. President, David Nam (ISB), says the GA2 committee addresses diverse topics, but, for this year's BEIMUN, topic two is "solving education-related

problems. specifically lack of access to education during the COVID-19 pandemic." Similarly, a delegate of the Second General Assembly, Maxwell (ISB), states some possible resolutions are to "provide support for the mental health of educators and learners, review relevant policy, work with organizations related to the UN, and encouraging cross-national cooperations." President David Nam recognized that "One of the solutions to reinforce access of education would be spreading awareness for funding, which could be invested to build non-profit organizations that provide free online education." Therefore, one main solution to the problem of education in the post-pandemic era could be to spread awareness.

Other solutions include increasing miliarity with digital tools, familiarity developing programs that support students in recovering lessons to reach these issues, which encompass measures such as supporting a more standard necessary and admiring to a more standar financing is required to enhance educational systems and solve resource infrastructure constraints. 











