BEIMUN cares deeply about academic honesty and originality, and we are serious about creating a safe environment for students to unleash their creativity. In order to preserve the integrity of this experience and foster genuine intellectual engagement, the use of Artificial Intelligence (AI) is strictly regulated. All solutions, speeches, POIs, and amendments should be the result of delegates' own efforts, promoting the core values of innovation and independent thought that BEIMUN stands for.

AI Before Conference

We require any and all preparation documents brought to the conference to be created entirely by humans. We understand that AI can be a supportive tool in doing research; however, permitting the use of AI for specific purposes may create large gray areas that lead to unwanted consequences and lack of clarity. Therefore, we ask you to respect and follow our AI-use guidelines.

AI is permitted to...	AI is not allowed to...
Refine the wording of their writing if the student is not confident in their English abilities. However, the students should keep any and all notes of brainstorming as proof.	Write full resolutions. While AI may be helpful in the early brainstorming phase, the resolution itself should be entirely developed by a human.
Used as a translating device to better understand the topic	Draft speeches
	Fabricate data and resources. All research and referenced examples, data, and other evidence must come from reliable sources.
